Plinking Range Rules

PLINKING RANGE RULES

1. This range was created for the fun of simply shooting and is intended for the complete un-organized enjoyment of the membership. **The only restrictions apply to safety.** As it is permissible to shoot at various distances from the targets, care must be exercised with multiple group usage. **When multiple groups are using the range concurrently, all shooters will meet to review safe gun handling rules and to designate the location of a common firing line.** In all cases if one group is firing **in front of the bench, others present are not permitted to touch or handle any firearms.** As a courtesy to all members, do not monopolize the range and have consideration for those that also wish to use the range. **In all cases, use common sense, be courteous, and consider the safety of others.**

2. Only pistols, shotguns, .22 caliber rim-fire rifles and center fire rifles that are chambered for a straight wall pistol cartridge may be used on this range. Rifles that are chambered for any bottleneck center-fire cartridge or .17 caliber cartridge are prohibited.

3. Informal targets such as metal cans and plastic jugs are allowed, and **WATER is the only liquid permitted** to be used in these targets. **ABSOLUTELY NO PAINT CANS!**

Remember to consider ricochet when positioning targets. Control your elevation – the trees are not a backstop and may not be used for target support!

4. An object containing any amount of glass is prohibited.

5. Clean up after yourself! **If you brought it in, you take it out!**
Spent Shotgun Hulls must be collected and hauled out!

6. Even under control, the practice of emptying magazines at the highest possible rate is still an **unsafe practice!**

Please review these rules and ALL Safety Rules before visiting the club!

March Monthly Meeting Thursday the 27th at 7 PM / Swap Meet at 5:30 Pm

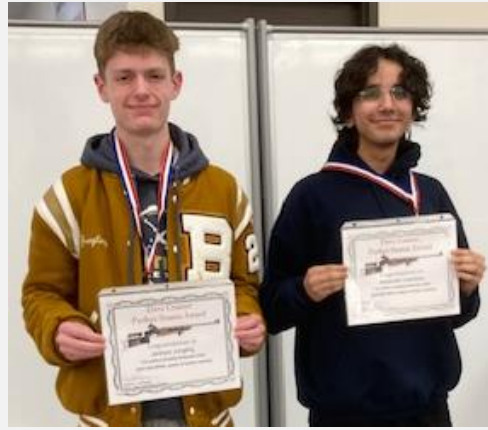
The main program is a presentation by Todd DePastino a local distinguished personality in Pittsburgh. He is the Executive Director of the Veterans Breakfast Club (VBC). The VBC is the most active Veterans association in our community. They conduct the obvious breakfast meetings but other activities and programs including podcasts. Veterans, if you are not a member, come listen and consider joining. Others interested in supporting Veterans should know you don't have to be a Veteran to join and participate within the VBC programs and activities.

Small Bore Matches at the Club

We hosted the Regional and State HS Rifle 2025 Championship for the team and individual competitions at our club over a four day / two-week period in February. The club presented our Award to the top individual competitor in the WPIAL or "Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic League". This trophy is called the **Taylor Eddy Award** in recognition of the late Earl Taylor and Mike Eddy. Earl and Mike served previously as our club president and have a long history of support for this HS competition. Both were competitive in match competition in WPIAL via their home in Greene County. **They were both ardent hunters, trappers and fisherman as youths in addition to shooting.** Additionally, they both had distinguished military careers in shooting with the US Army. Upon military retirement both relocated to Washington County and began their association with DMLSC. Also, they coached and mentored the youth in our club on small bore competition.

The trophy this year was **awarded to Jackson Jungling from the Butler Area HS. Jackson shot a perfect score of 200 and perfect X count of 20.** Second and third place lady shooters had a perfect score but were only one X count short at 19 X. There is a third parameter in the scoring called "center cut" which is a perfectly concentric shot in the X ring. That parameter to determine the winner this year was not required due to Jackson's perfect X count.

Our club associate team from Mt. Lebanon (ML) HS came in fourth place in the State Team Match. There was an additional award to a **ML participant, Alexander Chandran, who won the Cramer Award.** The Dave Cramer award is given to shooters who never drops a scoring point during the regular seasons' competition. Jackson (see above) also won the Cramer award! See pics!

There is some irony on the above with Jackson and Alex if you have read my February segment on HS and other smallbore competition. **In my February writing I wrote about the dominance of those great ladies in the shooting sports. That is still an accurate assessment, but the gents showed up this year.** Despite that on the WPIAL individual competition the ladies were still in 2nd and 3rd place. In the history of the Taylor - Eddy Award, those ladies hold a controlling percentage of 75. Obviously, Jackson and Alex are challenging Ted's posture!!



Some members of the club don't fully understand that we have youth from club members competing in HS Small Bore besides the ML team. **An example is the Mach family from Bethel HS whose father Michael is a club member. Please see the attached picture of his daughter Daphne and son Freddy.** Both were competing at the club for the regionals and state competitions this year. Freddy won an individual 2nd place in 2023. Freddy is also a **Taylor Grant recipient and a veteran of the NRA Whittington Camp.** Daphne was an applicant for the grant this year. See pic of this bro / sister duo. Freddy is a Bethel HS senior and has plans to attend WVU in the fall **majoring in Biochemical Pre-Med**, per my discussion with him at our hosted competition.

The competition was hosted by us over 4 days in two weeks in early February at our range. Dave Willard ran the line and did voluminous work to host competitors. Thank you, Dave! Rich Kunz and Diane Randolph provided a meal to host a contingent of competitors, coaches / staff and WPIAL staff for a group that ranged in size from 130 to 60 in Membership Hall (MH). Another contingent of members and spouses provided oversight and management of MH throughout the four-day event which included Rainy and John Nipar, Cindy and Kirk Marker, Maureen and Scott Patton, Ray English and Jacque Hildabrand. All are 5-6 year veterans of this hosting process.

Do you get the sense that we are building and protecting our future in the shooting sports by supporting this great youth program at the HS school level: absolutely.

A unique change is that all Camp Perry ranges now have a digital target system. This removes the pit duty requirement, and the time required to run the match. That will reduce stress on competitors. Thus, allowing the potential to shoot two rifles in a day. Some of us used to do that but two rifles per day

previously was a real endurance test. Typically, we used to have 12-15 members at the Nationals. Not sure what reduced participation, but those matches are a lifetime thrill. If you are a serious rifle shooting competitor! Just participating with a group of friends is a great experience. You need preparation and equipment! It is a 2-3 day time or longer time period but the expense is not significant especially if you stay in the barracks for \$15 per day. If you can shoot the CMP rifle matches at our club, you can shoot at Camp Perry.

Frazier Simplex Rifle Club match on April 6 – Invitation to participate received via Kirk Kirkham.

Consider this an invitation to all standing shooters to fire in the RK Moore Memorial 100 Shot Standing Match on April 6, at The Frazier Simplex Range. The match will use the Orion A-17 Target and electronically scored. For those not having Precision target rifle equipment an extra Standard 100 shot metallic (open or peep) sights match will be fired simultaneously using a .22 style hunting rifle. This match will use reduced paper silhouette targets and scored either a hit or miss (100 hits possible). \$ 10 entry fee both matches)

Matches begin 8:00 AM; using electronic target carriers; no time limit. Monetary awards in both matches. The precision match will also include the 72 year old perpetual trophy.

Hunting

In a discussion with a member at the BR range he gave me some interesting insight on Elk hunting in Utah. The new regulations now require that you hunt with aperture or similar iron sights. No glass! That is an interesting regulation change. Personally, I like it! Some elk hunting is being done at extremely long ranges beyond 400 yards. I saw an online video clip of a hunter who established a record long shot. He had 4-6 guides working for him. He paid an enormous amount of money. I will not mention the name, but it was a national sandwich shop owner whose net worth is significant. He pulled up on a horse with a series of guides. There was a 2nd series of guides who found the elk the previous day. The hunter took 20-30 minutes to set up his shooting rest etc. before the shot. The elk had no clue or potential ability to know of the situation. So, if that is the direction the sport is taking, I like the new Utah reg. Interesting!

John Livingston

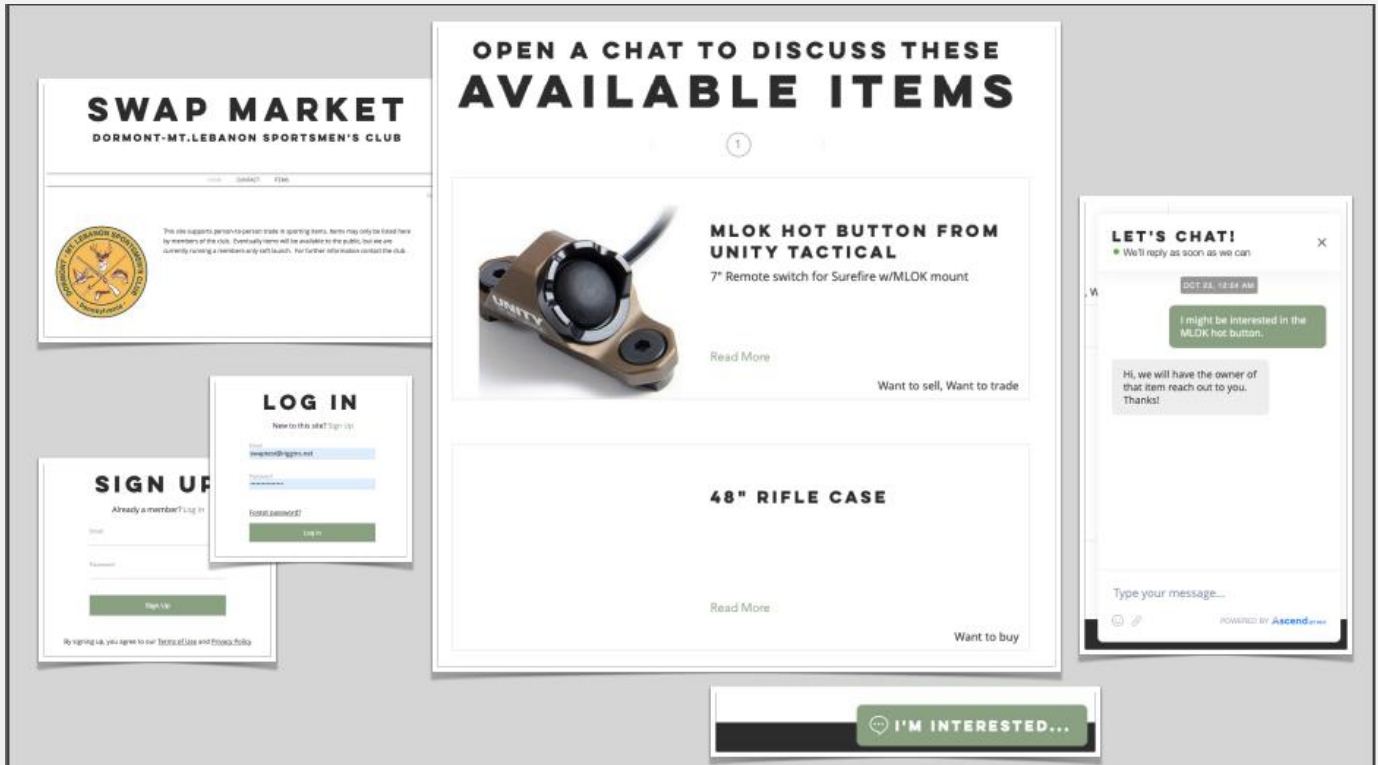

AMERICA'S RIFLE CHALLENGE (ARC)

ARC can be summarized by three words: **Exciting – Challenging – Fun!** So, what is it really?

Exciting: ARC is an action rifle & pistol program based upon defensive shooting skills using modern day firearms. Having a competition like format, events span entry level thru advanced, youth to adults, male and female. Stages incorporate the four basic shooting positions, multiple targets (paper, steel, and motion), barricade use, and multiple reloads.

Challenging: Events go beyond the typical target practice. The program is designed under NRA guidelines to ensure a safe yet challenging experience.

Clinics: entry level stages under the direction of NRA Certified Instructors and Range Safety Officers. **Advanced Rifle:** more rounds, more skills, more action. **ARC Plus:** The “plus” adds a pistol to the challenge and **don't forget** – we added a PCC category at the Pistoleer matches. Events incorporate the same skill sets and stages but involve matches using only the pistol or a pistol along with the rifle (2-Gun). We also will be bringing back the **22LR Special in October.**

Fun: **this program has a ton!** Sending rounds down range is great, but ARC takes it to a whole new level!

Each month starting with February, the monthly online newsletter will have more detailed info regarding any upcoming events. By looking in the online newsletter section from 2024, you will get a better feel for what the program entails as well as noting the increasing number of individuals who have already caught on to the American Rifle Challenge!

ARC Plus – Pistoleer/PCC Match

As part of the America's Rifle Challenge Program, DMSC will conduct **the first of two** Pistoleer/PCC Matches. Pistoleer/PCC Match?? **What is a Pistoleer/PCC Match?** If you have been shooting down on the lower ranges, then you are a "Pistoleer" and this match may be something of interest to you. Participants will compete in several "pistol only" stages firing at paper, steel, and motion targets. This is an action pistol match, and the course of fire entails modern day defensive shooting skills involving distances from 5 to 30 feet, multiple targets, barricades, several reloads, **and a whole lot of fun.**

*** **A PCC is short for a Pistol Caliber Carbine and as such can also be used.** ***

Date: Saturday, April 12, 2025 **Time:** 8 AM **Cost:** \$5 for DMLSC members; \$10 for non-members.

Pistoleer/PCC Course of Fire : Total rounds - 80

**** Note:** After signing up for the match, a full detailed description will be sent along with other important information. Below is an example of one of the seven stages. **

Stage 3: (7 yds.) Multiple Target Drill with Reload (Two 6-round magazines.)

**** This is a magazine retention stage**** When time begins, fire 2 shots to the left target's **lower A-Zone** and 1 shot to the left target's **upper A-Zone** and fire 2 shots to the right target's **lower A-Zone** and 1 shot to the right target's **upper A-Zone**, **reload while retaining the magazine**, then repeat the shot sequence.

Firearm Categories:

Iron Sights: a pistol or PCC that has only iron sights

Optics: a pistol or PCC that has only an optic, such as a Red Dot, laser, etc.

• **While there are no pre-requisites, this match will not involve any instruction, and participants should possess safe pistol handling skills.**

- All NRA Safety Rules and DMLSC Rules apply.
- Competitors need to attend a mandatory safety briefing conducted at the clubhouse.
- Keep all pistols cased and in your vehicles until instructed to bring them to the lower ranges.
- Eye/Ear Protection is mandatory.
- Calibers from 9 mm through 45LC are allowed, but no magnums. **All pistols must be securely carried in an exterior holster and PCC's need to have a sling attached.**
- The match will be conducted as an individual utilizing a shot timer. Scoring will be a combination of speed and accuracy. All stages will begin from the low-ready position.
- Competitors should have a minimum of 3 magazines for the semi-automatic pistols/PCC and will need to carry them on the person for each live fire stage.
- No incendiary ammunition. All stages utilizing steel targets - **Lead core ammunition only**, no armor piercing (AP), no solid or partial core ammunition containing steel or any metal other than lead.

Space is limited to 24 shooting positions. Registration starts on March 1, 2025. To ensure your participation, contact John T. via email: dmlscNRA@outlook.com

ARC Combined AR Rifle Clinic & Basic Match

Dormont-Mt. Lebanon Sportsmen's Club is sponsoring a **Combined AR Rifle Clinic & Basic Match** in conjunction with the America's Rifle Challenge (ARC) Program. This event is designed for shooters of all ages (14+) and **will be geared toward those with little or no experience using the AR Rifle Platform.** NRA Certified Instructors and RSO's will provide instruction on safe gun handling, introduction to action rifle skills, dry fire practice, and several stages of live fire. This event will progress at a slow enough pace for participants to gain an introduction to action rifle match protocol and develop a comfortable level of operation with the AR Rifle. **Successful completion of this event will qualify all for Advanced Matches scheduled for later in the year.**

NOTE: This event is **more robust** than either past Clinics or Basic Matches. **The entire event will be conducted outside on the Marsico Range and will occur rain or shine!**

Date: Saturday May 10, 2025 **Time:** 8:00 to 12:00

Cost: \$5 for DMLSC members; \$10 for non-members.

Live Fire Portion : 60 rounds total The Course of Fire will be supplied upon registration.

Rifle Categories:

Iron Sights: a rifle that has only iron sights

Optics Limited: a rifle that has only a non-magnified optic, such as ACOG, EoTech, Red Dot, etc. Back up iron sights are allowed.

Optics Open: a maximum of two optic sights with a maximum of one being magnified.

- All NRA Safety Rules and DMLSC Rules apply. NOTE: **do not use 5.56 ammunition in a rifle that is chambered only for the .223 caliber.**
- Eye/Ear Protection and Empty Chamber Indicators are mandatory (ECI's are available for a \$1 charge).
- Rifles need to be Zeroed for 100 yards **prior** to the match. No spotting scopes or shooting jackets. Shooting mats are allowed.
- Rifles should have attached slings capable of being worn across the back (but not mandatory).
- Competitors should have a minimum of 3 magazines and need to carry them on the person using a bandoleer, pouch, pocket, or similar device. Bring additional ammunition above the required number of rounds.
- No incendiary ammunition. **All stages utilizing steel targets** - Lead core ammunition only, no armor piercing (AP), no solid or partial core ammunition containing steel or any metal other than lead.
